Thank you to all of you - our graduates, former and present associates and friends - for joining us today in celebrating forty years of Japanese Studies at Monash University, coinciding with the 2006 Australia-Japan Year of Exchange.

The Department of Japanese was established in 1966 by Professor Jiri Neustupny, and this celebration is as much a homage to his achievements as a celebration of Japanese Studies in general. As part of the afternoon program, Professor Vera Mackie will dedicate the auditorium in the Japanese Studies Centre as the J V Neustupny Auditorium. Of course, he also founded the Japanese Studies Centre in 1981.

In 1998, the Department became part of a School of Asian Languages and Studies, and in 2002 was incorporated into a new School of Languages, Cultures and Linguistics. We are among the largest Japanese language programs in Australia, with around 1,000 students in first semester 2006, 12 full time teaching staff and an army of sessional teachers. Japanese language is taught at six year levels so students can enter at the level which matches their competence and exit three or four levels higher. We have formal exchange agreements with 12 Japanese universities in Japan, providing a variety of opportunities for our students to study in Japan.

We trust that you will find much of interest in the program today, including the symposium, the picture slide shows, and the dinner, and in catching up with old friends and associates.

Thank you to all who have sent messages of goodwill and congratulations, which are reproduced in this program.

Thank you especially to Professor Tetsuo Mizukami and to Ms Caitlin Stronell, who have travelled from Japan specifically to take part in the celebrations.

As current staff in this flourishing program, we will use the occasion to reflect deeply on the philosophy of what Japanese Studies at Monash stands for, and how we need to develop this concept in 2007 and into the future.
