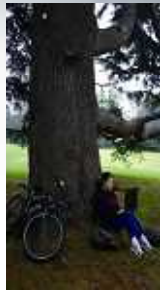

The Big Picture:

The Global Picture: Context

- The Sustainability agenda is becoming increasingly relevant to HE.
- HE considering the current and future impact of its educational, research, outreach and operational activities.
- Universities are motivated by the scientific challenge, moral concerns and/or a way of distinguishing themselves in a crowded market place.

The Global Picture: Regional Trends

- There have been many developments in the area of campus management and sustainability – particularly in the US, NZ and Australia.
- Few attempts at embedding ESD into the curriculum – Europe most advanced.
- Pacific and Africa key advances in offering specialist courses which meet needs of communities.
- Asia key developments in the science and technology research associated with sustainability.

The Global Picture: Thematic Trends

- Importance – good rationales.
- Campus Greening – with Carbon footprinting and ISO 14001 articles dominating.
- Community outreach – one off projects which involve external and internal stakeholders in activities.
- Curriculum – curriculum or professional development activities. Subject not institutional focused.

The Global Picture: Making In-Roads

- **Calls for institutional learning and institutional change towards sustainability.**
- **Institutional auditing – still focused on content analysis of courses or energy auditing.**
- **Few have considered how sustainability becomes a Strategic Priority in HE Institutions.**

HEEPI Higher Education Environmental Performance Improvement (HPI)	Aims to improve performance by developing benchmarking in further and higher education Provides useful information for senior managers Encourages good practice across institutions	Focus is on environmental performance rather than on learning Appears to offer open 'learning events' to disseminate information beyond scheme members
Universities that Count Environmental Association of Universities and Colleges (UAC)	HE benchmarking scheme Aims to raise awareness among senior managers Encourages cross-department and institutional learning	Based on existing commercial model transferred to HEs Focus on environmental performance and corporate responsibility rather than ESD
STAINWCH Sustainability Tool for Auditing University Curricula in HE (Dr. Wales)	An assessment tool developed to allow HEIs to measure their contribution to teaching from a sustainable development perspective	Only available commercially Complex to use – requires inputs from consultants Not easily used for cross-institution learning/comparison
AISBE Auditing Instrument for Sustainability in Higher Education (Netherlands/ES)	Based on EFQM Excellence Model Philosophy is: process-oriented, qualitative and descriptive	Does not reflect its philosophy, e.g. emphasis on certified environmental management practices Highly complex tool, too cumbersome for our purposes
UNESCO-UIS Developed separately but increasingly linked	Focus on ESD An, non-competitive benchmarking approach using both qualitative and quantitative indicators	Wide-ranging, cross-sector but chiefly based on schools HE indicators are not context-specific – too broad-based for institutional learning
Second Nature (USA)	HEs gathered case studies on some excellent practice in ESD and SD	Commercial approach run as a consultancy service Few institution-wide examples. Does not provide a benchmark
College Sustainability Report Card Sustainable Endowments Institute (USA)	Clearly identified indicators based on research into 'best practice'. Some useful ESD indicators under 'administration'	Focus is chiefly campus operations – ESD is a minor component
Sustainability Assessment Global Alliance of University Leaders for a Sustainable Future (USA)	Strong focus on ESD (curriculum and research)	Highly quantitative and prescriptive in its approach Includes than ESD – includes greenery goals with no clear link to learning
Grand Valley State University Sustainability Index (USA)	Useful example with clear emphasis on learning/ESD Solid focus on using indicators	Very specific to the institution Setting goals with no clear link to learning
The Green League 2008 (USA)	Clear layout with few indicators and informative notes for users	Covers all aspects of sustainability except ESD
Global Reporting Initiative Index (USA)	Wide range of indicators to review for learning outcomes Solid focus on using indicators	Wide range of indicators – focus on governance and environmental management
Berkley Campus Sustainability Assessment (USA)	4) out of 32 indicators related to learning/ESD	Focus is chiefly campus operations – ESD is a minor component

- **It means investment in capacity building**

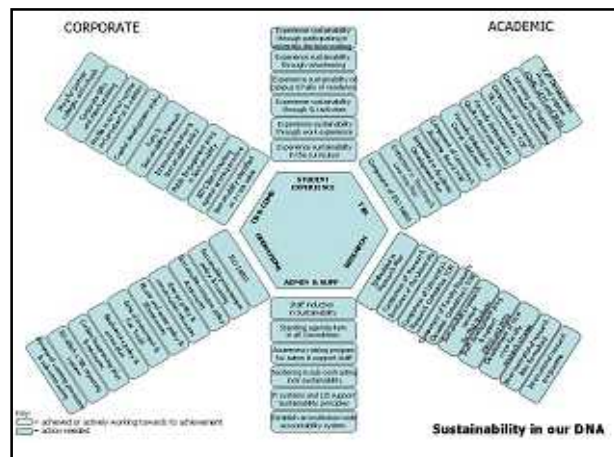


Sustainability as a Strategic Priority

Q. What does it mean?

UOG's mission (2005):

'... Within this overarching mission, the University will contribute fully to the economic, social and cultural life... It will also develop an approach to social responsibility which reflects its commitment to sustainability and social justice.'



Sustainability as a Strategic Priority



Q. How does it show?

- Sustainability is in the University's *mission, Strategic Development Plan, Teaching and Learning Strategy, Research Plan, Public Engagement Policy, etc.*
- As from Sept 08 - Sustainability will be standing agenda committees.
- All our research Institutes have sustainability as a core theme
- Procurement decisions influenced by sustainability
- University has an accountability system



Sustainability as a Strategic Priority



Q. How does it show?

- University wide bicycle loan scheme for students to cycle between campuses and around town.
- Progressive removal of personal printers
- Beginning to have paperless meetings
- High profile opportunities for academic debate
- Greener by Degrees – Soundings in Sustainability Literacy



Sustainability as a Strategic Priority



Q. How does it show?

- Ranked No.1 by *The Times* Green League of Universities (People and Planet 2008)
- 2008 Winner of the Continuous Improvement Green Gown Award
- 2008 Runner-up for ESD – Green Gown Award.
- 2008-2010 EU Marie Curie Fellowship for embedding ESD across University
- Media has labelled us as a Sustainability Champion

Most Employable!
97% of our graduates find employment after study

Recognising it is a journey of continuous improvement

Institutional narrative:

Going with the Grain of the Institution:

Tradition of religious inquiry which helped inform the university's commitment to social justice and responsibility

Context for ethical and moral commitment to sustainability

Framed the nature and focus of the University's leadership.

Q. How did it happen?

Commitment from the Top

Role of VC crucial in making sustainability a defining concept

Leadership led to UoG becoming the 1st English University to be awarded ISO14001 for whole of institution.

'Initially viewed as a high risk strategy by the SM - experience rapidly demonstrated that the outcomes was in fact the opposite'

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Sustainability as a Strategic Priority

Q. What still challenges us?

Everything...but particularly..

- enticing students to the agenda
- supporting academic staff within their discipline specialisms
- encouraging admin and support staff to develop their own responses and action plans.
- external funding sources to support institutional development
- International agenda and capital developments
- Communicating what we are doing – not as news worthy




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Sustainability as a Strategic Priority

Q. What have we learnt?



Recognise the importance of **relationships and partnerships** at the local, national and international level

Be inclusive and seek **engagement** of staff and students as well as external stakeholders

Have a **vision** and not just a strategy



Be **systemic** and not just **strategic** in its approach
